

The two most important pieces of equipment your Scout needs for camping are tents and sleeping bags. Here are some recommendations from our resident Eagle Scouts.

Tents can range from \$50 to several thousand and come in 2 primary types: dome tents and cabin tents. Dome tents are lighter and better for backpacking later in their scout career because they have curved walls and flexible fiberglass poles. They tend to do well in the rain butt are shorter so it will be generally harder for an adult to stand inside. Cabin tents are much taller and heavier. They are good for families and camping close to where you park. Mr. Maher is a big fan of CORE tents that can be found on Amazon. They're not the cheapest, but they're a good mix of ventilation for the heat, waterproofing for the rain, and reasonable price. One last piece of advice... Always compare the square footage of the tent, not the "6 man", "10 man", etc. Each brand will calculate the man rating differently.

Sleeping bags generally have a temperature rating, and can vary greatly in price. Read reviews, and if you are buying one in person, the more quilting/stitching the better. With each washing, the stuffing will shift less if there is more quilting.

Coleman products can be found at Walmart, are reasonably priced and are good quality. Mr. Sasala's tent and sleeping bag were made by Coleman.

Eagle's Corner

When did you become an Eagle Scout?

1988 (Ugh!!!)

Which troop were you in?

Troop 305 out of Bethany Lutheran Church in Parma, Ohio. Although I am Catholic, it was one of the best Troops in the area.

What was your Eagle Scout Project?

I worked to bring Scouts from 10 other local Troops and got a few local hardware stores to donate supplies to update a trail (including footbridges, steps, and handrails) around the entire Hinckley Lake. It took four weekends and countless man hours to complete. If you walk the lake today, the items may have been updated after 30 years, but the foundation is still mine.

What was your favorite merit badge?

My most exciting Merit Badge was Fishing. I was able to attend a high adventure week long canoe adventure in the Georgian Bay in Canada. The place was called Tinnerman Canoe Base. It was so remote, that there were no lights in a hundred miles of the places we went. As part of the trip, we were able to fish during down time in the waters of Canada. I was hoping to catch some small pan fish as the final requirement to the merit badge, but instead reeled in a 27 inch Northern Pike. It scared the daylights out me at the time and was one of the most amazing experiences of my life. The fish was awesome on the grill that evening. I will never forget it.

Tell me about something you did as a scout that has had a lasting effect on your life.

 I have been blessed to attend two high-adventure Scout trips while a member of Troop 305. At age 13, I went (without my parents) to Cimarron, New Mexico to the Philmont Scout Ranch where we hiked 110 miles in a week highlighted by a snowball fight on the 4th of July at the top of a mountain. I was later able to attend the Tinnerman Canoe Base adventure where we spend a week canoeing along islands within the Georgian Bay in Canada. I will always have those great memories. Philmont is still there and I hope some day to go back with Tommy. Tinnerman is gone however.
